Welcome to the Term II academic work and a very busy period for a lot of development works and the upcoming Bushfoods Conference. Learning in a small and supported environment can be challenging for the teachers without their parental support. Success comes only to those who try and follow instructions to complete little tasks day by day. Most students have been fully engaged in class work and focused on their careers. Preparing for TAFE, work experience and new jobs can be overwhelming, however, at ATAC we work closely with our students to prepare them to refocus on pathways that are realistic and acceptable to them to think of their dream careers in the future. The completion of Year 12 QCE and starting an early career with additional Certificate II Work for Skills & Vocational Pathways (FSK20119), Certificate II in Workplace Skills (BSB20120) and a Certificate II or III in a trade from TAFE or another RTO, is unique to ATAC. All our year 10 students have registered for the Trade Taster program and all year 11 students are enrolled at TAFE for 2023. ATAC is aiding each student into work experience or apprenticeship to meet their expectations, a learning experience that suits their needs and abilities via flexible pathways. ATAC is proud to provide an opportunity and a unique journey with a firm outcome by the end of year 12.

By nurturing the learning skills and training students to learn and teach, builds selfconfidence and esteem within each person. Infrastructure Development Plans

Despite some delays we are getting close to the completion of our multi-purpose shed. It is expected to be fully ready by the end of May. Most earth earthworks are complete, and we are ready for the completion of electrical, plumbing and sewerage works in the next couple of weeks. The open learning spaces, amenities and the commercial kitchen will provide opportunities to increase the numbers to enroll more students for approved courses for senior schooling and higher education. The multipurpose building will also provide an opportunity to host some Council approved public functions onsite.

Bushfoods Conference May 26-28th 2023

Board Chair, Ms. Irene Bayldon, Prof. Rod Drew, and Dr. Narendra Nand have been discussing the progress of the shed and the planning of the first "Australian Bushfoods Conference" incorporating (8th Queensland Bushfoods Conference) at ATAC. The conference is jointly hosted by ATAC, Queensland Bushfoods Association (QBA) and the Australian Institute of Horticulture (AIH). The twoday national conference to be held at ATAC on 27-28th May 2023 is the first National event on Bushfoods and ATAC is proud to be hosting it. Prof. Rod Drew and Dr. Nand have conducted past 6 Queensland Bushfood Conferences at Griffith University and the 7th conference at ATAC with the support of QBA and ATAC board members. The First conference was held at Nathan campus in 1998. Full information and registration information is now on ATAC and AIH websites.

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
