Principal's Message

First semester reports have been completed after the Term II assessments. Term II holidays started on Monday 26th July 2023. After two weeks break, Term III started on 10th July 2023. Reports have been completed and students have been receiving their reports. Parents/guardians are most welcome to discuss their child's progress and appointments can be made at your convenience.

Year 10 students are encouraged to attend TAFE classes and their work experience and be seriously focused on their careers. Year 11 students have been provided with information to enroll at TAFE for 2024 round as soon as the enrollment opens. ATAC staff will provide full support for the applications and students and parents are encouraged to discuss their career options before filling the application forms.

Students gain a Certificate II or III in a trade from TAFE or another RTO and receive four certificates including Certificate II Work for Skills & Vocational Pathways (FSK20119), Certificate II in Workplace Skills (BSB20120) as they complete year 12 and get into the workforce. Our unique pathway enables students to complete their Year 12 QCE and enter the workforce whilst at school.

ATAC assists students with work experience or apprenticeship via flexible pathways so that students can begin their careers earlier than most people of their age. ATAC is proud to provide such a great opportunity.

Infrastructure Development Plans

The multi-purpose shed is almost fully complete pending final fixtures, fittings, compliance, and completion certificates. Because of the hard work and the generosity of our directors, the shed has become a landmark facility for ongoing seminars, workshops, conferences, and events that could also generate some income for the college. The urgency to complete the venue to host the conference was greatly affected by the bad weather causing soaring costs for the earth earthworks, electrical, sewerage and plumbing works which had to be completed only days before the conference. The shed also provides amenities, open learning spaces, and a commercial kitchen with the opportunity for future growth and development of our college.

Despite setbacks, ATAC proudly hosted the first Australian Bushfoods Conference and the 8th Queensland Bushfoods Conference from 26-28th May 2023. We greatly appreciate the contribution made by our chair Irene Bayldon, patron Prof. Rod Drew, AIH president, Alan Burnell, past president Mr. Michael Casey, QBA and several Indigenous presenters at the conference. We greatly acknowledge the financial support of the Logan City Council that sponsored the conference to be held in Logan.

Community Engagement

The gardens have irrigation systems with free tank water available to all hobby gardeners.

Work skills have become increasingly important in building positive attitude, tolerance, and perseverance in young people. With work experience, project-based learning and independent learning experience students tend to build personal skills and improve academic

achievements. ATAC works closely with businesses, training organizations and parents or guardians in empowering students with job-ready skills and knowledge. ATAC facilitates skills training with any opportunity provided by businesses or self-employed trade companies to give hands-on experiences and training. Students build relevant skills, obtain their White Cards from TAFE and become more positive to work. This increases their opportunity for apprenticeship and jobs.

Term 3 has begun and all students have finished all assessment pieces for Semester 1 and all reports written.

This term year 10 students reading a novel "Two Wolves" by Tristan Banks. Awards: Winner, KOALA & YABBA Children's Choice Awards; Children's Book Council of Australia Honour Book; Shortlisted, Prime Minister's Literature Awards. Review: It is clear that Tristan has so carefully considered each and every word in this novel – seemingly simple writing is often the hardest to get just right and 'Two Wolves' took him four years to write. 'Two Wolves' will challenge, extend and take readers right out of their comfort zone, asking them to consider some big questions.

Are we destined to become like our parents/grandparents? Is it okay to lie to protect your family? Does adversity really breed strength? Does money buy happiness?

As we read this novel the students are looking at plot structure, characters, and themes within the novel. The year 11 students are also looking at texts that are about human experiences such as biographies and biographical films i.e. Lion, 127 Hours and The Great Escape.

For Mathematics the year 10 students are learning about percentages, money and wages and the year eleven students are learning about travel, distance, timetables, and speed. Agricultural Studies is all about poultry as we look to improving our poultry runs and raising chickens for eggs or for eating.

For Science we will be looking at Physics, speed, friction, and energy and for History, it is about our part in the Vietnam War and the subsequent change in Australian immigration policy in the 1970's as a result of the war.

Working with our students is a very rewarding experience for me and seeing them all grow in

confidence and in skills and knowledge is a great privilege. Over their time here at ATAC, I hope that you will see your young person grow more confident and happier as they gain new skills and learn in other ways.

ATAC was founded in 2015, started operation in October 2016 with first new students in February 2017 at a rented premises in Parkinson. ATAC moved to the current location in January 2018 upon hiring a demountable classroom building and refurbishing an existing building for administration. After a series of hurdles and delays, ATAC managed to complete a multipurpose hall in May 2023 which was used for a very successful first Austraklian Bushfoods Conference (8th Queensland Bushfoods Conference) from 27-28th May 2023 with presenters and participants from across the nation. The Multipurpose Hall will be used for open learning areas, HPE, workshops, short training courses in Agriculture/Horticulture and Hospitality. The hall has a commercial kitchen which will be used for training and community events and amenities to cater for future growth and development.
