Principal's Message

Students in year 11 are almost completing their assessments and FSK Cert. II while year 10 have finished the trade taster program at TAFE and are completing their final assessments for 2023. Two year 10 students have enrolled in Certificate I construction for 2024 and one is doing Certificate III in Engineering at TAFE. Every student completes a Certificate II or III in a trade from TAFE or another RTO, Certificate II in Work for Skills & Vocational Pathways (FSK20119), Certificate II in Workplace Skills (BSB20120) and their QCAA approved QCE or year 12 completion certificate.

ATAC supports School Based Apprenticeships for senior students with any company wishing to engage our young people. Students must meet their Job-ready skills assessment, recommended by staff and supported by parents/guardians. ATAC students begin their careers earlier than most people of their age and at times sign up apprenticeships by mid-11 or early year 12. It is an extremely pleasant feeling to parents and students on early engagement and with a career focus.

Infrastructure Development Plans

ATAC has partially completed the front fences and plans to build the gate and entry for a facelift. After completion of major works of our multipurpose shed, we are in the process of doing the multi-purpose shed a landmark facility, to provide opportunities for seminars, workshops, conferences, and events. Completion of the amenities and the kitchen is expected soon so that the facilities could be available for use by students and the public. With a grant from Greenbank RSL, we will be able to equip the shed with indoor sports and physical fitness equipment for use by students, staff, and community members. The shed has open learning spaces, a commercial kitchen, and amenities to allow the opportunity for future growth and development.

After several ongoing meetings with the Bee All Natural directors, Natasha and Jason Roebig and with the support of Logan City Council grants, ATAC is working towards providing beekeeping workshops and training. Bee All Natural has engaged with ATAC to provide opportunities to locals and young people in the beekeeping industry. The last three Logan City Council's KRANK School holiday Beekeeping programs have been held at ATAC and there is a lot of interest in young people for education and training in beekeeping. Bees play a major role in the biodiversity of our flora and fauna species, and fruit crop and honey production. There is an everincreasing need for more people to be involved in the fledgling industry.

Our tunnel greenhouse has arrived, and we are waiting for LCC approval to the amendments for the multi-use of the shed. As requested by several growers, we intend to provide some horticultural training to our local growers especially the North Maclean Community Garden members who are growing some vegetables on our site for a supplementary income.

Community Engagement

An opportunity for close partnerships between parents/ guardians, students, and the staff is provided by our TRIPOD model. Understanding, tolerance, resilience, and goodwill between parents/guardians and ATAC is the key to the progress and success of our students. With a lot of personal attention to their progress, and career pathways, our TRIPOD model is the key to reengagement and success of our students. Honesty, hard work, responsibility, resilience, and respect are a priority, and students engage to build selfconfidence and self-esteem as they learn how to become good learners.

ATAC has been working with Natasha and Jason Roebig, for the past five years and there is a tremendous opportunity for us to develop a longterm beekeeping training program. A meeting held this week has given us an opportunity to iron out some issues and start our project as soon as possible.

"Grow Your Own Vegetables" (GYOV) is now a theme we are working with the members of the North Maclean Community Garden (NMCG) who have started their planting. ATAC has filled the tanks to supply free water via an irrigation system to water the plantation. New volunteer members are always welcome to join the group or the ATAC committee. Our progress and achievements are published in our monthly newsletter and is made available to all parents/ guardians and our supporters via emails or on our website.

Student Engagement

ATAC is working with some businesses and selfemployed trade companies to provide hands-on experiences and training. Maintaining close relationship with businesses, training organizations and parents/ guardians, we are assisting and empowering students with job-ready skills and knowledge. At the college, we focus on project-based learning so that young people become responsible for their own learning and success. Social media is a challenge, but as students become engaged, they realize the need to be focused and self-directed in attaining personal skills for their success. Personal skills such as a positive attitude, tolerance, perseverance and understanding enable young people to become responsible for their future goals. ATAC facilitates training with hands-on experiences, work experience, obtaining their White Cards, joining TAFE for their trade careers and to find jobs while still at school.
