#### **Principal's Message**

A very successful Awards evening was conducted on 22 November 2023 at the ATAC multipurpose facility. Students in year 11 received Semester II reports, subject awards, and Cert. II in FSK. Year 10s received their semester II reports and year 10 completion certificates. Layne received best student of the year and Davlin (Ellie) received her progress award. All students in year 12 next year will attend TAFE and do Cert. II in Workplace Skills and their QCAA subjects and sign up for apprenticeship opportunities. Two year 11 students have enrolled in Certificate I construction for 2024 and one will do Certificate III in Engineering at TAFE. Every student completes a Certificate II or III in a trade from TAFE or another RTO, Certificate II in Work for Skills & Vocational Pathways (FSK20119), Certificate II in Workplace Skills (BSB20120) and their QCAA approved QCE or year 12 completion certificate at the end of senior schooling. What a great achievement for those enjoying a more informal educational experience at ATAC.

ATAC students begin their careers by mid-year 11 or early year 12, earlier than most people of their age. They also sign up for apprenticeships by midyear 11 or early year 12. Students are prepared to meet their Job-ready skills assessment and then recommended by staff to employers with the support of parents and/or guardians.

What a pleasant feeling for the parents and students with and an early engagement into their career pathway. Companies are fully supported with all the paperwork to meet legal obligations of all parties.

#### Infrastructure Development

Our multi-purpose shed is a landmark facility, and provides opportunities for seminars, workshops, conferences, and events. The amenities and the kitchen are almost ready and will be available for use by students and the public. After completion of manor works of our multipurpose shed, we are in the process of purchasing equipment and resources from grants for indoor sports and physical fitness to be used for use by students, staff, and community members. Thanks to RSL Greenbank for the grant. The shed has open learning spaces, and this allows us to enroll more students and provide hospitality training and beekeeping opportunities.

Bee All Natural has engaged with ATAC to provide opportunities to locals and young people in the beekeeping industry. The last three Logan City Council's KRANK School holiday Beekeeping programs have been held at ATAC and Natasha and Jason are working closely with us to start ongoing Beekeeping programs at ATAC. A major grant from the Logan City Council has assisted us in generating interest in young people and work towards formal training programs. Bees play a major role in fruit crops and honey production and the biodiversity of our flora and fauna species. ATAC is ready to provide the facilities for the education and training to beekeeping enthusiasts.

#### **Community Engagement**

The North Maclean Community Garden members are continuing to plant some vegetables of interest for a supplementary income. ATAC provides free tank water supply via an irrigation system to water the vegetable gardens. "Grow Your Own Vegetables" (GYOV) is now a theme we are working on with the members of the North Maclean Community Garden (NMCG). Members have started their planting and there is a good start with heavy rains. After LCC approval, our infrastructure will support a tunnel greenhouse in the training of vegetable growers in various horticultural activities and for native plant production.

Our "TRIPOD" model provides an opportunity for close partnerships between parents/ guardians, students, and the staff. Understanding, tolerance, resilience, and goodwill between parents/ guardians and ATAC is the key to progress and success of our students and the college. With a lot of personal attention to their progress, and support to career pathways, our model is the key to re-engagement and career pathways at an earlier age. Honesty, hard work, responsibility, resilience, and respect are a priority and students engage to build self-confidence and self-esteem as they learn how to become keen learners.

New volunteer members are always welcome to join the group or the ATAC committee. Our progress and achievements are published in our monthly newsletter and is made available to all parents/ guardians and our supporters via emails or on our website.

#### Student Engagement

ATAC is working with some businesses and selfemployed trade companies to provide hands-on experiences and training. We maintain close relationships with businesses, training organizations and parents/ guardians, to assist and empower our students with job-ready skills and knowledge. We focus on project-based learning so that young people become responsible for their own learning and success. Despite a lot of social media challenges, our students become engaged as they realize the need to be focused and self-directed in attaining personal skills for their success. Personal skills such as a positive attitude, tolerance, and perseverance and understanding enable young people to become responsible for their future goals. ATAC facilitates hands-on experiences, work experience, obtaining their White Cards, joining TAFE for their trade careers and to find jobs while still at school.

# **DISCIPLINE-A CULTURE**

Discipline is an intricate human behavior. It is a subject that needs to be handled with a perceptive mind. To say that discipline is obeying rules or code of behavior is too simplistic and naive.

The essence of discipline begins at home where parents/guardians play a critical and crucial role in instilling and nurturing discipline from childhood. Parents/guardians need to set rules and standards for themselves to be able to govern and direct the behavior of their children.

Discipline recognizes the consequences of action and inaction. From the consequences one can perceive the nature of discipline. In fact, every action or inaction results in some form of discipline.

It is true that discipline helps us to learn and grow as human beings. It is a building block of our personality. Tragedy challenges discipline. Our unswerving determination and steadfastness teach us to cope with adversities, thereby shaping and molding our thoughts and emotions so that we maintain our equilibrium.

Genuine and charismatic leaders inspire others to become naturally disciplined. They act as role models and their actions and performance are indeed, infectious. For they lure them to emulate and absorb their discipline in their lives.

We need to reflect on these soul-searching questions to find a positive pathway to attaining discipline. There is a perceptible difference between punishment and discipline. Punishment focuses on making a child suffer for breaking rules while discipline focuses on teaching a child to make a better choice next time.

Self-discipline is a concept that focuses on the ability and capacity to manage one's thoughts, emotions, or behavior in the face of temptation to achieve a specific goal. In short, this term is often referred to as self-control, willpower, restraint, persistence and determination. In the context of school, examples of self-discipline include punctuality to class, focusing attention in class, prioritizing to do assignment and in being respectful to teachers, fellow mates and treating people with whom you interact with dignity and humility. Let's spread discipline as a shared culture which defines a disciplined human being.

Dalai Lama XIV in The Art of Happiness captures the concept of discipline so effectively.
